I'm glad that this old dog can still learn from the seemingly obvious lessons that surround him every day.





- * Ctrl + click will select a sentence. Just click anywhere in a sentence while you are holding the Ctrl key and the sentence will be selected.
- * You can select an entire paragraph by making three rapid clicks anywhere in a paragraph.
- * Have you ever wanted to create a horizontal line in your document? Just type 3 hypens and then press Enter.
- * Subscript and Superscript help your documents look nice and professional. Ctrl+ will make a word subscript. Ctrl Shift + will make a word superscript.
- * When you hold down the Ctrl key and then press the backspace key, you will delete the preceding word.
- * Shift + F5 will move the cursor to the location where it was the last time you saved the document.



Productivity: Microsoft PowerPoint Tips & Tricks



Here are a few tips to help you create a powerful PointPoint lesson/presentation:

- * Don't overdo the images! Less is usually better. Use images that are quality and reflect the message you are wanting your students/audience to remember.
- * Use only one point or idea per slide. If you put all your points on one slide, the students/audience will be reading everything on the slide and not listening to you.
- * Stop using lots of animations. They are distracting and not essential.
- * Put a copy of your PowerPoint presentation on a flash drive or external hard drive. Never trust that you will have a reliable Internet connection.
- * Graphs and charts are better to use than a spreadsheet graphic.
 MUCH better!
- * Only use fonts that are easy to read, not "pretty," and are large enough to easily view.

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
